
## Communists and Aryans

## The Fate of Communists in Germany

## Who and What an Aryan Was

An Aryan was considered by Nazis to be a fair-skinned person who had Germanic or Norse heritage and spoke an Indo-European language like German. Not all German citizens were considered Aryan, you had to have Germanic or Norse heritage and couldn't be Jewish. Other Aryan countries included Austria and Norse countries like Sweden The theory of the supposed Aryan master race originated in the mid-19th century as a way to justify white superiority. Hitler later used the Aryan race theory as a way to justify the killing of Gypsies, Jews, and Africans. The word Aryan comes from the Sanskrit word *arya*, which means noble or distinguished.
