## EXTENDED RESPONSE SAMPLE

Please read the selected portion of Edgar Allan Poe's "The Tell Tale Heart." In a complete paragraph using ample textual evidence, explain how the author uses literary devices in order to create a specific mood. You MUST determine which mood you will discuss (options may include, but are not limited to: haunting, gloomy, foreboding, nightmarish, suspenseful, hopeless, cold, violent, tense). You must discuss and include supporting quotes for at least TWO literary devices.
Consider literary techniques such as word choice, symbolism, metaphor. simile, allusion, imagery, hyperbole, personification, setting, etc.

## *Be sure to use introduce and explain each quote you use to support your argument.

"It is impossible to say how the idea first entered my head. There was no reason for what I did. I did not hate the old man; I even loved him. He had never hurt me. I did not want his money. I think it was his eye.
