- How does the author portray William 2.0?
- Why does William 1.0 choose to conceal his real name?
- Why does William 1.0 describe himself as evil?
- Why didn't the people that William 1.0 controlled see the likeness between the two?
- Doppelganger literally means "ghostly double." How is the idea of a doppelganger used in this story?
- What is William 2.0's physical defect? Why is it important?
- How might the different settings in the story reflect the character of William Wilson?
- What does William resent more having to share his name and appearance with another man, or the second William Wilson's interference with his affairs?
- The narrator claims that he was victim to a cruel fate; what sort of fate is he talking about? Is this really a case of destiny?
